### Foresight into the Future

We currently have the largest school age generation that has ever lived in Australia. Australia's adolescent generation is also at record levels, comprising 20% of the current population. The opportunities that lie ahead for this generation are exceptional, igniting innovation, passion and enthusiasm. The World Economic Forum has dubbed this the 4<sup>th</sup> Industrial Revolution, a period of unprecedented possibilities as billions of people connect through devices with virtually unlimited access to knowledge. Many see this as a revolution which will evolve at an exponential rather than linear pace and in doing so disrupt virtually every industry. Futurists in the educational field are predicting chiasmic shifts to continue to enrich the role of schools, especially in the areas of wellbeing, health, assessment and information technology.

While the focus on strengthening trade and economic links with Asia will continue, through the advancement globally in technology, the whole world is predicted to be able to seamlessly communicate, conduct business, share ideas and learn at a faster, more rapid pace and more often than not in real time. *'For many parents, schools are a key source of training opportunities through which parents learn how to assist their children with the use of technology for school work. Schools are increasingly*

*equipping parents to manage the impacts of technology in the home, however, there is ongoing opportunity for schools to continue to provide assistance in this area.'*

BMGS is setting a course to continue to be a 'forerunner' in educational excellence, faith integration and holistic and inclusive wellbeing practices that inspire hope and build platforms for students to thrive. The key for our community is to have the courage and determination to set coordinates that are ambitious, advancing and proactive to take us into all that God has destined for us to be.

The McCrindle Institute has also just released the '*Christianity in Australia Research findings*' from their comprehensive work in 2016. It gives great insights and helps people understand the nature of Christianity in Australia.

I encourage all parents, families, community members and alumni to read the research and become an advocate for advancing us into the future. May those who feel led continue to pray for this incredible school.

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## **FROM THE CHAPLAIN**

In the TV series *Mythbusters*, conundrums were addressed and evidence was gathered through experimentation in order to determine whether the 'myth' was plausible, busted or confirmed. On some occasions, viewers would send in complaints about what they perceived to be shortcomings in the mythbuster's methodology and the show would then re-test. While there was entertainment value in the banter, what I found particularly worthwhile was the willingness to pursue the evidence to a logical conclusion, even when it conflicted with preconceived ideas regarding the outcome.

Perhaps this willingness to examine all the evidence and not allow preconceived ideas to hinder is a worthy life lesson, and yet... I wonder how many people who have decided against Christianity, have made no genuine effort to examine the evidence and challenge their preconceived ideas. Admittedly the sorts of conundrums addressed by *Mythbusters* had less personal repercussions regardless of the results, but if the claims of Christianity are true, our decisions have eternal significance. Can we afford to be less than diligent?

When C.S. Lewis made the decision to renounce his atheism and accept Christianity, he described himself as the most reluctant convert in all of Christendom; he didn't become a Christian because he couldn't cope with life, or because he was looking for comfort but rather because in all intellectual honesty, he couldn't deny the truth that he found in Christianity. Recently I listened to Francis Collins (project director for the Human Genome Project) echo the same sentiments in recounting his own conversion from being an atheistic scientist to being a scientist who accepted Jesus as Saviour and Lord.

The great privilege we have in this country is that we can access so much evidence for ourselves. Maybe we can be our own *Mythbusters*... if we are truly willing to follow the evidence where it leads.

*“And the scripture says: ‘Whoever believes in Him will not be put to shame’. And that “whoever” means anyone, without distinction between Jew or Greek. For all have the same Lord, whose boundless resources are available to all who turn to Him in faith. For: ‘Whoever calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved’ (Romans 10:11-13).*

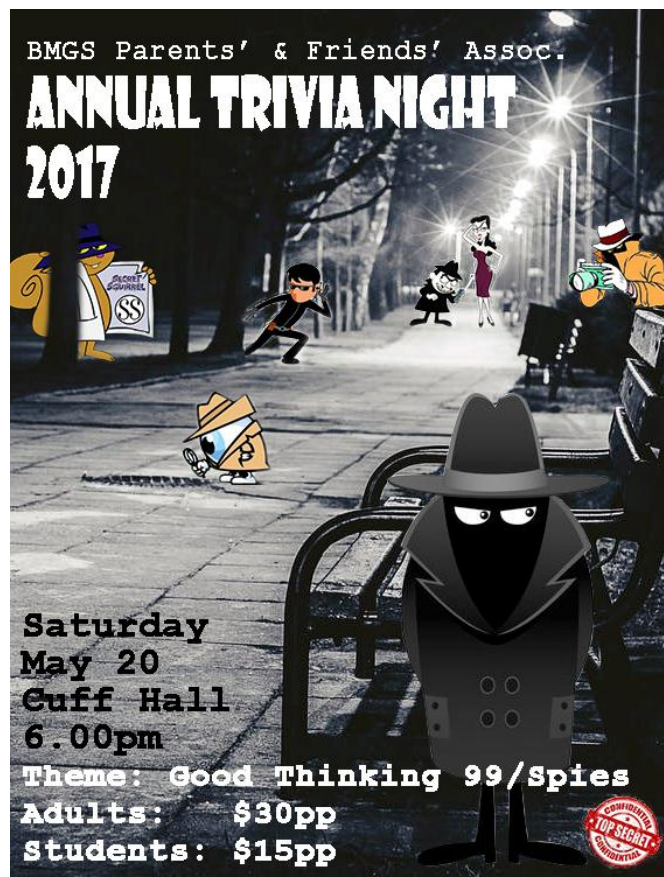
### Annual Trivia Night

2. Getting motivated to start studying
3. Knowing which content to focus on

### **What can parents do to support and encourage students to study?**

Here are six tips from parenting expert Dr Justin Coulson:

1. Make age appropriate requests
2. Force creates resistance, so allow a degree of autonomy
3. Encourage routine
4. Minimise distractions – use devices as a reward after study
5. Avoid making criticisms – ask what your child thinks of their work
6. Model good time management – actions speak loudly

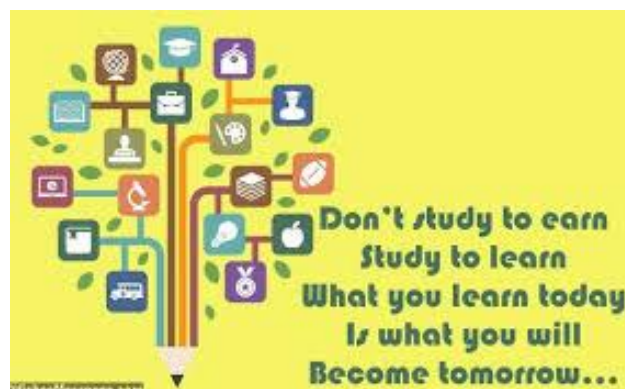
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## **FROM THE LEARNING ENRICHMENT DEPARTMENT**

## Match Reports: Saturday, 13<sup>th</sup> May, 2017

### Girls' Football

#### BMGS First XI were defeated by Oakhill College, 5-0

It was a Saturday at home in the mountains and not only did we have spectacular weather for the girls and it was our first game without travel which was lovely for the parents and players. We came up against one of the top two teams of the competition – Oakhill College - who have a very experienced team and a high composition of representative players. Oakhill dominated the first half leading 5-nil, but we warmed into the game in the second half to have a few shots on goal and start to build our passing game. This season has been a revelation for the BMGS girls. To play against such skilled and fit players we need to adjust and be able to play more sideways and backwards like the opposition does to build up possession. Our girls are working on their game awareness and to be much more vocal to support better decision making in the field. We recently learned that almost all of the boys and girls First XI teams train twice each week and this shows on the field. So we have asked the girls to train on Thursday as well as their usual training day, just for the next five weeks, so this will cover half the rounds and build confidence and fitness. I have been so proud of the girls these past three weeks. It has truly been a serious challenge to take on teams with so many rep players. Rep players are training and playing five times per week in total. This repetition builds great game awareness for the player and flexibility to adjust to different styles of play. Our girls have fought back, each second half, and have never given up. This season for the girls is a balance between two major areas: firstly, learning how to play possession football against seriously good opposition and, secondly, how to put yourself in a mental state that exudes courage under fire. Girls, and parents, my commitment as a coach is to find that balance between fun and challenging you to go to that next level individually and as a team. I look forward to helping you achieve both outcomes! I am also looking forward to our game at home this weekend and finally meeting all the parents after the game. 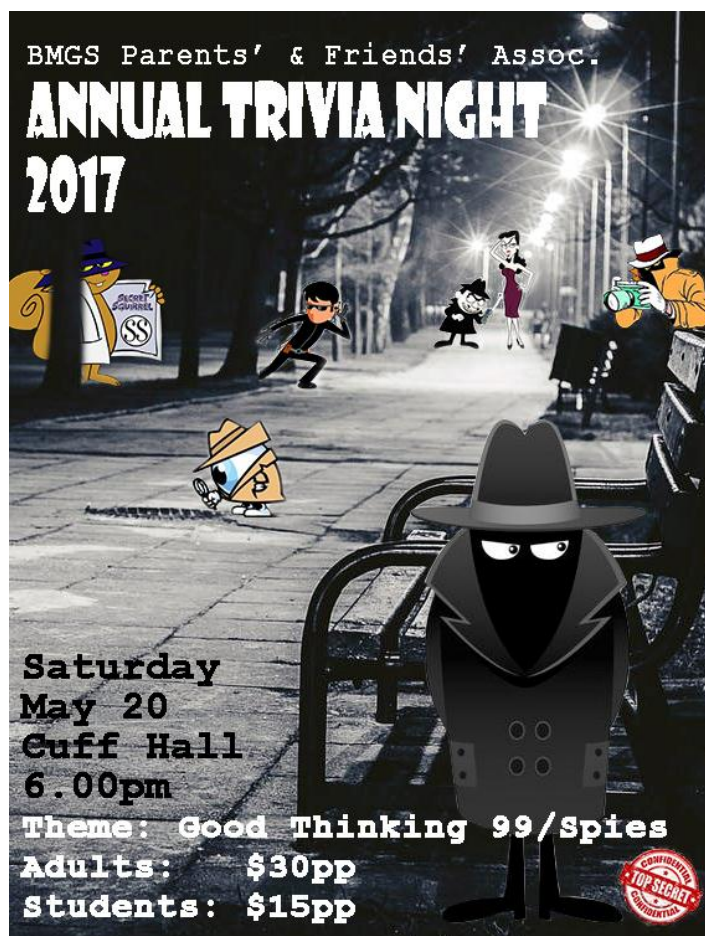
