FROM THE HEADMASTER

The BMGS Community

On Monday this week I had an impromptu meeting with a former student of the School who was a member of Year 12, 2016. This young lady just wished to say hello as it was nearly a year since she had left. She also wanted to catch up with her former teachers.

As the conversation unfolded, she informed me of the progress she had made in her university studies this year and that she had achieved a High Distinction GPA for her first semester. She told me how she missed being at BMGS, especially seeing her friends and teachers nearly every day. She mentioned the tremendous, positive impact that individuals within the BMGS community had had on her life. She commented on the encouragement she had received, in addition to that provided by her family, when at times she felt overwhelmed and unsure of her future direction. She let me know that the care and support provided by the School had been of great assistance to her, which consequently had had a significant impact on her progress in Year 12, and in her subsequent choice of course at university.

Belonging to this community does give us a sense of shared purpose and identity – to educate and inspire children and young people to enable them to believe in themselves, and to strive to be their best.

I really appreciated that this former student felt she could return to the School, come to see me unannounced, and then go to spend some time catching up with her former teachers. I am sure they appreciated that as well.

SCHOOL ZONE OFFENCES WHAT ARE YOU RISKING?



Children are small, harder to see, behave unpredictably and are extremely vulnerable. They need **YOU** to take extra care when driving and parking around school zones.



No Parking

You have 2 minutes to drop-off or pick-up and must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.



No Stopping

Under no circumstances are you permitted to stop on a length of road to which a No Stopping Sign applies.

PENALTY \$330 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS



Bus Zone

You must not stop your vehicle in a Bus Zone unless you are driving a public bus.





Mobile Phone Use

Do not use a hand held mobile phone while driving.

\$439 +4 DEMERIT POINTS

Speeding Offences

The fines and demerit points for



speeding offences in school zones have been increased.



Pedestrian Crossings

Do not stop on or near a marked crossing.



Driveways

Do not stop on or across a driveway.



Lane Filtering /Overtaking

Motorcyclists must not overtake or lane-filter in an active school zone.

Double Parking

Do not double park in a school zone.

PENALTY \$330 +2 DEMERIT POINTS

Footpath and Nature Strip

Do not stop on a footpath or nature strip.

FROM THE CHAPLAIN

When Jesus told the story of the man on the Jericho road who is beaten, robbed and left for dead; when He described how a priest and a temple worker rush by their injured countryman without stopping; when He portrayed a Samaritan merchant stopping to care for the Jewish man (even though Jews and Samaritans hated each other at the time): Jesus was explaining that loving your neighbour meant caring for all those with whom we share the planet! We call this story the Parable of the Good Samaritan, and it is so powerful that the expression 'good Samaritan' has come to be applied to anyone who goes out of their way for another, without seeking reward.

Near the end of the narrative, the Samaritan takes the wounded man to a place of safety and rest, he cares for the man through the night and then leaves the innkeeper enough money to continue caring for the wounded man, promising to cover any shortfall that may accrue, upon his return to the region. This open-handed generosity is probably why the Samaritan's Purse charity (the group that runs Operation Christmas Child) are so diligent about extending their aid and assistance to people (as their mission statement puts it) "without regard to the race, creed, gender, religion, or ethnicity of the beneficiaries."

Of course this is the same motivation and policy for groups like Compassion (whose Child Survival programme BMGS supports in Bitung), World Vision (who run the 40 hour Famine) and the Salvation Army (who we assist with their Red Shield Appeal). Indeed this is the historic policy of the Church, as Lactantius (240-320 AD) said "we are plainly all of one family. Therefore it must be considered an abomination to hate another human, no matter how guilty he may be. For this reason, God has decreed that we should hate no one, but that we should eliminate hatred. So we can comfort our enemies by reminding them of our mutual relationship. For if we have all been given life from the same God, what else are we but brothers? ... Because we are all brothers, God teaches us to never do evil to one another, but only good—giving aid to those who are oppressed and experiencing hardship, and giving food to the hungry."

Christian charities in the modern world carry on this tradition of sacrificial love and open-handed generosity. They don't merely throw money at a problem but work to give people a hand-up, rather than just a hand-out since they believe that all people are worthy of dignity, being made in the image of God. I feel honoured to participate in this history of beneficence through the work of groups like Samaritan's Purse, Compassion, etc. and I am encouraged that so many in our school are participating in Operation Christmas Child**.

"Anyone who sets themselves up as "religious" by talking a good game is self-deceived. This kind of religion is hot air and only hot air. Real religion, the kind that passes muster before God the Father, is this: Reach out to the homeless and loveless in their plight, and guard against corruption" (James 1:26-27).

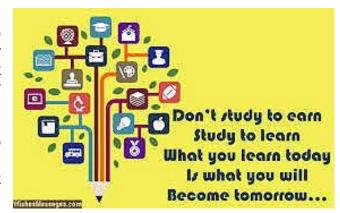

ANNUAL 45KM WALK TO BUNGAWARRA

The 2017 45km Charity Walk to Bungawarra will take place on Saturday, 7th October.

The Walk is from the School property at Wentworth Falls to the School campsite at Bungawarra on the Cox's River.

This Walk is a sponsored walk for charity and runs only through the generous support of staff, parents and caregivers. This year the money raised will be in aid of the Compassion Child Survival Program in Indonesia, the Ibulanku School Project/Uganda, Maleke School in Fiji and Greystanes Disability Services. Students are encouraged to gain sponsorship for the Walk.

Walkers will meet at the Senior School at 5:30am and start the Walk at 6:00am at the Roundabout, finishing at Bungawarra at approximately 5:00pm. As far as possible, the route takes advantage of dirt tracks and alternative roads but there are times when we are walking on some busy roads. WHAT?

So our challenge is to try and live on \$3 a day for 3 days, with the money we would normally spend on ourselves (on food and drink), going to those who have to live on less than \$3 a day, every day. <u>Sign up using the form below and bring in your \$3 registration fee.</u>

HOW?

- Is it possible? Yes. Will it be easy? No otherwise it wouldn't be a challenge!
- You won't be starving, but don't expect to eat what you would normally eat everyday (for example, you obviously won't be able to afford takeaway coffees, but you can still drink coffee!)
- Plan your 3 day, \$9 budget, looking out for special deals.
- You can use parts of packets of food you already have at home as long as you calculate how
 much it is worth and take it off your \$3 a day budget. E.g. if want to use two tea bags a day,
 find out the cost of the box of tea bags, and the price per tea bag, then take this away from
 your \$3 a day budget.
- Collect all the food you are going to use in one place (i.e. box or fridge shelf) and keep it separate from other food in the house.
- Plan your meals! Take a photo of each meal you make and how much it cost i.e. porridge for breakfast, with milk and half a banana, costing 67c, upload to Instagram using the hashtag above.
- Access Instagram and use the hashtag above to share awareness of this issue, tell people
 you are taking the challenge and challenge others to take it too, or to sponsor you!
- Upload photos of your stash of food costing \$3 a day to Instagram using the hashtag above.
